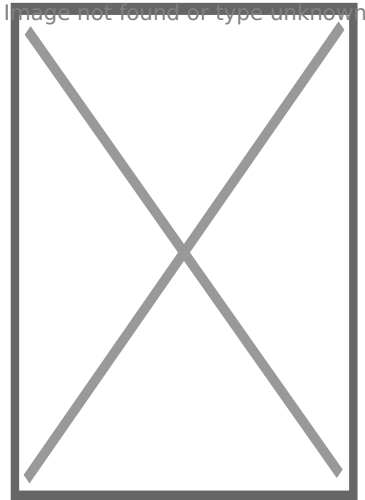

Looking at U41, Usener says the author is uncertain and gives the citation "Vol. Herc. 2, 10.201 fr. 44" and the text "...καὶ ἄλλῃ κἀν [τῷ Περὶ Ὅσιότητι[ος, κἀν τῷ] δωδεκάτῳ καὶ] τρεῖσκα[ιδεκάτῳ] Περὶ Φύσε[ως, κἀν τῷ] πρώτῳ[ι τῶν περὶ] Τιμοκράτους."

I am unable to find the P.Herc. for this quote. Any ideas about finding a source for the text would be much appreciated.

Also, do we have any translations of Philodemus *On Wealth*?

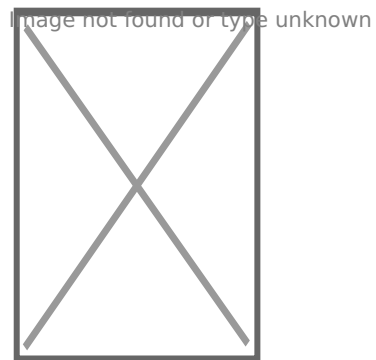
135) Es ist noch ein Wort über die Spottnamen zu sagen: *Ληρόκριτος* (*Ληρόκριτος*), *Σαννίδωρος* (*Αντίδωρος*). Solche Namen der Philosophengeschichte wären einer besonderen Untersuchung wert; Antisthenes macht den Anfang, indem er Platon *Σάθων* nennt (Diog. III 35). Daß hier die Tendenzliteratur manches erfinden konnte, wird man zugeben müssen. Verdächtig erscheint auch *Πομπικός* (statt *Ποντικός*) als Beinamen des Herakleides Diog. V 86 (er schließt einen pikanten Satz ab). Man findet ihn bei Bion wieder: *Ἐν τισὶ δὲ καὶ πομπικός καὶ ἀπολαῦσαι τύφον δυνάμετος* IV 47.

Philodem zählt einige schimpfliche Dinge auf, die von den Gegnern (den Stoikern) den Epikurern nachgesagt wurden. Die Buchzahl war wie Col. XIV 26: *ἐν τῷ ζ Περὶ τοῦ καθήκοντος* und IV 9: *ῥ και α ἔτων* (Memor. Gr. Herc. 200) durch einen Buchstaben wiedergegeben. Durch die neue Stelle wird auch die Überlieferung von cod. H bei Diog. X 23 (Us. Fr. 73) *ἐν τῷ τρίτῳ Τιμοκράτει* (-κράτης BF, -κράτους Us.) gerechtfertigt. Ebenso war bei Diog. X 23 (Us. Fr. 37) die Lesung der Hss.: *ἐν τῷ πρώτῳ Μητροδώρῳ* nicht zu ändern. Außerdem erscheint der 'Timokrates' noch in einem Zitatentrest: Pap. 1111 Fr. 24, X² 201, Us. S. 108, Körte S. 546, das ich in folgender Weise ergänzen möchte: *κάν τῆ Πρὸς —] ΔΗ[— ἐπιστο]λῆι κἀν [τῷ Περὶ ὁ]σιότητε[ος κἀν τῷ] | δωδεκά[τῳ καὶ τῷ] | τρεῖσκα[ιδεκάτῳ] | Περὶ (φ)ύ[σ]εως κἀν τῷ | πρώτῳ | τῶν Πρὸς] | Τιμοκράτῃ· καὶ ἐκ] | τῶν Μητροδώρον σ[τ]ον ἐν [τῷ Πρὸς τὸν] | Εὐθύφρονα κἀν τῷ] | Πρὸς Ἀριστοτ[έ]λῃ | Μάλιστα [δὲ Ἐρμαφ]χος (ΚΩC die Abschr.) [ἐ]ν τ[ο]ῖς λεγομ[έ]νοις Ἐρι[στικ]οῖς ἐκ[ε]ῖνην ἐκτίθεται γνώμην. Usener hatte τὰς περὶ Τιμοκράτους ergänzt. Es ist verkehrt, wenn Körte bei Metrodoros zwischen einer Schrift *Τιμοκράτης* und einer andern *Πρὸς Τιμοκράτην* einen Unterschied macht. Er schrieb *Ἀριστοτ[έ]λῃ* für *Ἀριστοτ[έ]λη* und ließ die Reste nach *μάλιστα* fort.*

Another win from Brigham Young! Thank you TauPhi. Erik Anderson does not provide translations for a lot of the Philodemus quotes. This paper covers P. Herc. 1570, which is Philodemus, On Wealth, Book number unknown -- and I am saving it for when we get there! But in the U40's Usener is pulling from Philodemus, On Wealth, Book 1, which corresponds to P.Herc. 163.

It's Pap. Herc. 1111

It's not "Vol. Herc. 2, 10.201 fr. 44." but it's "VH²" and it stands for 'Herculansenium voluminum Collectio altera' volume 10 published in 1875. It's fragment XLIV in there. Unfortunately,

archive.org has only volumes up to 8th so not sure if you can find it scanned anywhere else online.
